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Dimension: Income and Employment




1. Income above the Poverty Line

Dimension: Income & Employment		Indicator: Income above the Poverty Line
Client version of indicator: We have enough income		
Definition: Household income is above the Poverty Line for the UK.		
		
<p>Our household income is always above 60% of the UK average, i.e., Single: £9,500, couple with no kids: £14,200, couple with two kids: £20,400.</p>	<p>Our household income, this year, is above 60% of the UK average, i.e., Single: £9,500, couple with no kids: £14,200, couple with two kids: £20,400.</p>	<p>Our household income is always below 60% of the UK average, i.e., Single: £9,500, couple with no kids: £14,200, couple with two kids: £20,400.</p>




2. Stable Income

Dimension: Income & Employment	Indicator: Stable Income	
Client version of indicator: Our monthly income doesn't change		
Definition: Household income has not changed significantly in the past 6 months. A stable income promotes well-being, long-term planning and financial flexibility. A family's income should not vary greatly from month to month.		
		
Our household income is stable.	Our household income doesn't change that much.	Our household income always goes up and down and we can't plan ahead.




3. Credit Access

Dimension: Income & Employment		Indicator: Credit Access
Client version of indicator: We can get credit		
Definition: The household can get credit at acceptable rates with good advice. The family understands the difference between credit for basic household goods and longer-term purchases.		
		
<p>In our household everyone has good credit scores; we can borrow money from a bank.</p>	<p>Someone in our household has bad credit scores; borrowing money can be a problem because we don't know how to get good advice.</p>	<p>In our household we can't get credit or any proper help to get some; we borrow from loan sharks.</p>




4. Family Savings

Dimension: Income & Employment		Indicator: Family Savings
Client version of indicator: We have savings		
Definition: Savings cover emergencies or unexpected events. The household does not have significant debt.		
		
<p>We save and we can cope with emergencies; we have at least 3 months of expenses set aside. We don't have a lot of debt.</p>	<p>We have some money to save, but we can't save too often because debt and bills are hard to cope with.</p>	<p>In our household we don't have money to save, or for emergencies. We have lots of debt and can't keep up with our bills.</p>

5. Diversified Sources of Income




Dimension: Income & Employment	Indicator: Varied Sources of Income	
Client version of indicator: We have more than one source of income		
Definition: The household has different sources of income which are consistent.		
		
<p>In our household more than one person has a job, or the only person who works has a secure job.</p>	<p>In our household only one person has a job, but the income from it isn't secure. Or, our second-income source is unreliable or comes from benefits.</p>	<p>No one has a job in our household, or our income is not fixed. We rely on benefits.</p>

6. Personal Identification




Dimension: Income & Employment		Indicator: Personal Identification
Client version of indicator: We have ID		
Definition: All family members have proper and valid ID-documentation.		
		
<p>We all have proper ID. We have things like birth certificates and drivers' licences to show, if asked.</p>	<p>Someone in our household has ID problems; we can find ways to sort it.</p>	<p>Someone in our household does not have/has a problem with proper ID. We don't know how to/can't afford to fix it.</p>

7. Stable Housing

Dimension: Housing & Infrastructure		Indicator: Stable Housing
Client version of indicator: Our housing situation is secure		
Definition: The housing situation is secure and stable.		
		
<p>We can rent long-term, or we own our property. We are happy with our rental contract and can move somewhere else if we want to.</p>	<p>We are unhappy with our current rental contract, or we might have to move. We might not be able to stay in our home because we can't afford it.</p>	<p>We have slept somewhere that is not our home for one night or more in the last year; or we live in a temporary place; or we fear eviction; or we had to leave our home without wanting to.</p>




8. Household Appliances

Dimension: Housing and Infrastructure	Indicator: Household Appliances	
Client version of indicator: We have essential household appliances		
Definition: The household has essential appliances, e.g.: fridge, freezer, washing machine or other.		
		
<p>In our household our basic appliances work. We have a fridge, freezer, washing machine, cooker, etc.</p>	<p>In our household some basic appliances are faulty or broken.</p>	<p>In our household we can't often use/don't have basic appliances.</p>




9. Cooking Facilities

Dimension: Housing and Infrastructure		Indicator: Cooking Facilities
Client version of indicator: We have proper facilities to prepare food		
Definition: The household has all the proper facilities and equipment for proper food preparation		
		
<p>We have a proper kitchen with everything to cook and store food for our household.</p>	<p>Our kitchen isn't bad, but we need to fix things or get more stuff to cook properly.</p>	<p>We do not have a proper place to cook. We have to cook somewhere else or share a crowded space.</p>




10. Access to Gas/Electricity

Dimension: Housing and Infrastructure		Indicator: Access to Gas/Electricity
Client version of indicator: We always have gas/electricity		
Definition: Members of the household have unrestricted access to gas and/or electricity.		
		
<p>We can afford to pay for gas and/or electricity all of the time</p>	<p>We have gas and/or electricity, but we can't use it all the time because of the cost.</p>	<p>In the past year, sometimes there has been no gas or electricity and we have had to choose between cooking or heating.</p>




11. Safe Home

Dimension: Housing and Infrastructure		Indicator: Safe Home
Client version of indicator: We have a safe home		
Definition: Safe housing conditions.		
		
<p>Our house is very safe. There are no broken appliances, structural damage, loose wiring or damp. Doors and windows lock; the building withstands all weather conditions.</p>	<p>Our house has a few safety issues that may be bad for those living there, e.g.: windows let in the cold; risk of flooding.</p>	<p>Our house is in bad condition. People who live there are at risk because of, e.g.: damp or mould, heavy-rain flooding, doors and windows don't lock properly.</p>




12. Sanitation and Sewage

Dimension: Housing and Infrastructure		Indicator: Sanitation and Sewage
Client version of indicator: We have a proper bathroom		
Definition: The house has a proper bathroom.		
		
<p>In our house we always have access to a bathroom which has got good ventilation, hot- and cold-running water, privacy and is cleaned often.</p>	<p>In our house we share the bathroom with 4 or more people, and/or the bathroom is not regularly cleaned or is defective.</p>	<p>In our house we do not always have access to a bathroom, and/or our bathroom is in a bad state.</p>




13. Separate Bedrooms

Dimension: Housing and Infrastructure	Indicator: Separate Bedrooms	
Client version of indicator: We have separate bedrooms		
<p>Definition: Everyone in the household has their own living space in the house. Adequate housing provides: sufficient space, safety and privacy for every household member; it prevents overcrowding and sharing the same bedroom with: (a) an adult, (b) adolescents (> 12 to 18 years) and (c) children.</p>		
		
<p>In our house adults, teens and kids do not sleep in the same bedrooms; the house is not overcrowded. Everyone has their privacy.</p>	<p>In our house adults, teens and kids sleep in the same bedrooms; some people in our house want more space or privacy.</p>	<p>In our house many people sleep in the same bedroom. Adults, teens and kids share bedrooms with each other. Our house is overcrowded and we need more space.</p>




14. Home Comforts

Dimension: Housing and Infrastructure	Indicator: Home Comforts	
Client version of indicator: We have the furniture we need		
Definition: The house has all of the necessary facilities. Chairs, tables and beds ensuring the family can eat, rest, study or work comfortably. Fans and heaters or good ventilation ease the effect of hot or cold weather.		
		
<p>In our house we have enough space to work and relax in. We have enough furniture and appliances to be comfortable</p>	<p>Our house is quite comfortable, but we could do with better furniture and appliances, or the house is too messy to relax in.</p>	<p>. We do not have enough furniture or appliances to live comfortably. There is not enough living/eating room or proper facilities to relax with.</p>




15. ReliableTransport

Dimension: Housing and Infrastructure	Indicator: Reliable Transport	
Client version of indicator: We have access to good transportation		
Definition: Members of the household have access to and can afford their own means of transport (car, motorcycle, bicycle), or public means of transport: bus, taxi (available hourly) to get about regularly.		
		
<p>To get to the places we often go, we have our own transport (car, motorcycle, bicycle); or we have good access to public transport.</p>	<p>To get to the places we go often, transport isn't always handy, or costs too much. Sometimes we can't find the money to get about.</p>	<p>We don't have our own transport and public transport in our area is unreliable, e.g. a bus now-and-then that costs too much.</p>




16. Access to Shops and Services

Dimension: Housing and Infrastructure	Indicator: Access to Shops and Services	
Client version of indicator: We can access the shops we need		
Definition: The household can access its preferred stores and local services easily. Not being able to access preferred shops due to isolation, or lack of those stores in the area, can mean overpriced products and limited choices.		
		
<p>We can always reach the shops and services we need, e.g.: food and hardware shops, hairdressers, banks etc.</p>	<p>Sometimes going shopping is difficult, e.g.: too expensive, shops are far away, carrying heavy bags is a chore, etc.</p>	<p>A lot of the time we can't go shopping, e.g., shops are far away, too expensive, carrying heavy bags is a chore, etc.</p>




17. Communication

Dimension: Housing and Infrastructure		Indicator: Communication
Client version of indicator: We have a phone and internet access		
Definition: The household has access to affordable communication, including internet.		
		
Adults in our household have affordable mobile phones and internet access.	In our household we have mobile phones and/or the internet, but we can't always afford them.	In our household we don't have a mobile phone or the internet.




18. Security

Dimension: Housing and Infrastructure		Indicator: Security
Client version of indicator: We feel safe where we live and work		
Definition: Members of the household feel safe in their area of residence and work. Security is an essential part of any family's well-being.		
		
We feel safe where we live and work	We don't feel safe either where we live or where we work.	We don't feel safe where we work and live.

19. Clothing and Footwear




Dimension: Housing and Infrastructure		Indicator: Clothing and Footwear
Client version of indicator: We have the clothing we need		
Definition: All members of the household have proper clothing and shoes for year-round conditions.		
		
<p>In our household everyone has proper clothes and shoes for all conditions/needs e.g. for work.</p>	<p>Our household has enough clothes and shoes, but we don't always have proper clothing, e.g. work. We have winter clothes, but need more.</p>	<p>In our household we do not have proper clothes or shoes, especially for winter. We often depend on donations.</p>

20. Insurance




Dimension: Health and Environment		Indicator: Insurance
Client version of indicator: We have insurance		
Definition: The household has protection against unexpected events.		
		
<p>We have good insurance and it covers all possible risks.</p>	<p>We have some insurance, but we aren't sure if it covers everything, or it doesn't offer the best protection.</p>	<p>We don't have proper/any insurance.</p>

21. Set Meals

Dimension: Health & Environment	Indicator: Set Meals	
Client version of indicator: We have plenty to eat		
Definition: Meals (breakfast, lunch, dinner) are not limited by insufficient or irregular income.		
		
<p>In our household we always have enough to eat.</p>	<p>In our household we sometimes battle to buy enough food for our needs.</p>	<p>People in our household have had fewer than two meals a day, or have gone hungry in the past few months because we can't afford food.</p>




22. Eating a Nutritious Diet

Dimension: Health & Environment		Indicator: Eating a Nutritious Diet
Client version of indicator: We eat a healthy diet		
<p>Definition: A nutritious diet includes a range of balanced foods to ensure good health. A healthy balanced diet includes consuming sufficient amounts, weekly, of:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Dairy products or suitable alternatives. A variety of fruit and vegetables (5 a-day). Eggs, beans, meat or fish / other types of proteins. Potatoes, rice, pasta, cereals or other carbohydrates. 		
		
<p>We know what a healthy diet is and we eat healthy food.</p>	<p>We get confused about how to eat healthy or can't afford to buy healthy food. We aren't sure if our diet is healthy or not.</p>	<p>We don't know or think about healthy eating and our diet does not usually include fruit or vegetables.</p>




23. Health-Care Access

Dimension: Health and Environment		Indicator: Health-Care Access
Client version of indicator: We have access to health care		
Definition: Members of the household are registered with a local GP and use the service when needed.		
		
<p>Everyone in the house has a local GP and is happy to use this service when needed.</p>	<p>In our household everyone has a GP, but some of us don't always go to the doctor when we should.</p>	<p>Someone in our household hasn't got a local GP or doesn't go to the doctor when sick.</p>


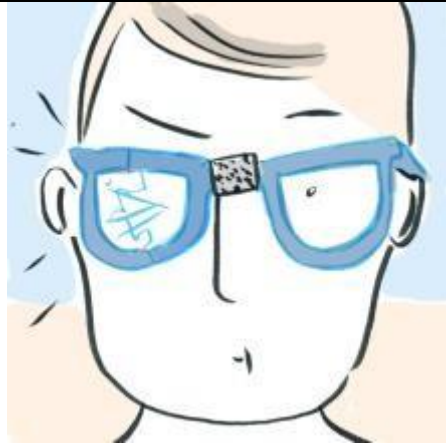

24. Personal Hygiene

Dimension: Health and Environment		Indicator: Personal Hygiene
Client version of indicator: We keep a good level of hygiene		
Definition: Members of the household have good, consistent hygiene practices.		
		
We keep clean all the time by washing hands, bathing and brushing teeth daily	Sometimes we can't take baths or we don't wash our hands or brush our teeth daily.	Not everyone in our household keeps soap and toothpaste.




25. Sexual Health

Dimension: Health and Environment		Indicator: Sexual Health
Client version of indicator: We understand sexual health		
Definition: Members of the household are informed about their sexual and reproductive health.		
		
<p>All members of the household understand sexual health and family-planning, and use contraceptives like condoms and the pill.</p>	<p>Members of the household understand sexual health and family-planning, but take risks. They can get contraceptives like condoms and the pill, but don't always use them.</p>	<p>Members of the household don't know about sexual health and family-planning and can't get contraceptives like condoms and the pill.</p>




26. Eyesight

Dimension: Health and Environment		Indicator: Eyesight
Client version of indicator: We have good eyesight or glasses		
Definition: The family understands the importance of eye-care and has access to it. It knows how to use it and has healthy eyesight.		
		
No one in the household has eye problems that aren't seen to; everyone goes for check-ups every 2 years.	A member of the household with an eyesight problem hasn't been for an eye check-up in the last 3 years. This person knows how to get support.	A member of the household hasn't gone for an eye check-up in more than 5 years; glasses are needed but cost too much. There is no support for this problem




27. Dental Care

Dimension: Health and Environment		Indicator: Dental Care
Client version of indicator: We visit the dentist regularly		
Definition: The household understands the importance of dental care; has access and knows how to use it.		
		
<p>In our household everyone visits a dentist regularly.</p>	<p>Someone in our household has not been to the dentist in the past 5 years.</p>	<p>In our household someone needs to see a dentist but can't/doesn't know how to, or can't pay for it.</p>




28. Vaccinations

Dimension: Health and Environment		Indicator: Vaccinations
Client version of indicator: We are up to date with vaccinations		
Definition: The household understands the importance of immunisation, and all family members have been properly vaccinated.		
		
<p>In our household everyone has had all their vaccinations. They know how this will keep them healthy.</p>	<p>In our household we need vaccine boosters, or choose not to vaccinate.</p>	<p>In our household there are people who haven't been vaccinated or aren't sure if they have been or not.</p>

29. Rubbish Disposal




Dimension: Health and Environment		Indicator: Rubbish Disposal
Client version of indicator: We manage our rubbish well		
Definition: Correct disposal of the waste generated in the household.		
		
<p>We use all the rubbish-removal services, including pay-to-collect for bulky items. We can recycle at the neighbourhood recycling centre.</p>	<p>Our household has rubbish bins, but they aren't used properly. The rubbish-removal system is bad and pay-to-collect bulky items cost too much.</p>	<p>Our household doesn't have/doesn't use a household/common rubbish bin. Rubbish isn't often collected.</p>

30. Clean Environment




Dimension: Health and Environment		Indicator: Clean Environment
Client version of indicator: Our neighbourhood is free of pollution		
Definition: The household is safe from pollution of any kind.		
		
Our neighbourhood is always clean, free from, e.g.: dog dirt, litter in the street or bad air quality	Our neighbourhood is clean, but not always. The air quality isn't great.	Our household environment is dirty, e.g., dog waste, litter in the streets, bad air quality. It is a health hazard, or it has already affected our health.

31. Literacy

Dimension: Education & Culture		Indicator: Literacy
Client version of indicator: We can read and write in English		
Definition: All members of the household can read and write in English at appropriate levels, e.g. can write a CV or a work-report.		
		
<p>Everyone in our household can read and write English well, including writing for work purposes.</p>	<p>Everyone in our household can read and write English well, but need help with harder writing tasks or reading.</p>	<p>Some members of our household don't read and write English well enough.</p>




32. Children Enrolled in and Attending School

Dimension: Education & Culture	Indicator: Children Enrolled in and Attending School	
Client version of indicator: Our children attend school		
Definition: All household members of schooling age attend school.		
		
<p>All members in our household finished school and all kids will get their GCSEs. Anyone 16-18 is either in school/college or an apprenticeship/traineeship.</p>	<p>Some in our household might not finish school or get a minimum of C in English /Maths GCSEs, or won't finish school, college or an apprenticeship/traineeship.</p>	<p>There are children in our household who aren't in school and should be. 16-18-year olds aren't in school or college or in any training, e.g. for an apprenticeship.</p>




33. Knowledge and Skills to Generate Income

Dimension: Education & Culture		Indicator: Knowledge and Skills to Generate Income
Client version of indicator: We know how to get a job or make money		
Definition: Having necessary skills to be able to access employment or generate income.		
		
<p>Everyone in our household has the skills and knows how to find employment or start a business.</p>	<p>People in our household have some skills to get employment, but struggle with, e.g., application forms, interview skills.</p>	<p>Some adults in our household have no skills to get employment, start a business, or have never worked.</p>




34. Planning and Budgeting

Dimension: Education & Culture		Indicator: Planning and Budgeting
Client version of indicator: We have a budget		
Definition: The household plans, budgets, and spends according to their income.		
		
<p>We have a household budget and stick to it.</p>	<p>There is a household budget, but sometimes we spend too much.</p>	<p>In our household we struggle with money, or we live on next to nothing.</p>




35. Communication and Social Capital

Dimension: Education & Culture		Indicator: Communication and Social Capital	
Client version of indicator: We have good friendship groups			
Definition: Safe and broad social network.			
			
<p>We mix with many people who are a good influence on us. We use these connections to open up opportunities.</p>	<p>We mix with people, but we don't make the most of it.</p>	<p>In our household we don't mix much and those people we know have a bad influence on some of us.</p>	




36. School Supplies and Books

Dimension: Education & Culture	Indicator: School Supplies and Books	
Client version of indicator: Our children have school supplies		
Definition: Household members of school-going age have access to the necessary supplies to participate fully at school.		
		
<p>In our household kids have all the uniforms, school supplies/books needed.</p>	<p>In our household kids have basic uniforms and school supplies, but we can't afford anything extra.</p>	<p>In our household kids don't have the school supplies they need or they aren't good enough.</p>




37. Access to information

Dimension: Education & Culture		Indicator: Access to Information
Client version of indicator: We are well informed		
Definition: Members of the household have access to media to inform and entertain themselves. They are news-aware.		
		
We can get information from different media for both news and entertainment.	We can get information, but not always. We use the access we have for entertainment rather than the news.	We don't get or get very little news and entertainment.




38. Entertainment and Recreation

Dimension: Education & Culture		Indicator: Entertainment and Recreation
Client version of indicator: We get involved in activities		
Definition: Every member of the household has access to recreational activities, at least on a weekly basis.		
		
We regularly take part in neighbourhood leisure activities, as well as elsewhere. We have all we need to join in and we can afford it.	We sometimes take part in leisure activities in our neighbourhood, or we quit because it costs too much.	We don't take part in leisure activities outside of our household.




39. Cultural Traditions and Heritage

Dimension: Education & Culture		Indicator: Cultural Traditions and Heritage	
Client version of indicator: We value our culture			
Definition: The household values and recognises cultural traditions, and has a feeling of belonging.			
			
Our household keeps and knows social traditions, and we fit in well with others.		Our household sort of fits in with others, but we sometimes feel cut off.	
			
		In our household we don't fit in with others.	

40. Respect for Diversity




Dimension: Education & Culture	Indicator: Respect for Diversity	
Client version of indicator: We respect differences		
Definition: Members of the household respect and value cultural diversity. They treat people equally [who do not share their beliefs (sexual, religious, cultural, etc.)].		
		
<p>All of our household accepts and respects cultural differences; they treat everyone the same.</p>	<p>Some of our household does not accept or respect differences; they treat people unfairly if their ideas, religion, race or sexual choices are different.</p>	<p>Most of our household doesn't accept or respect differences; they treat people unequally</p>

41. Human-Rights' Awareness




Dimension: Education & Culture	Indicator: Human-Rights' Awareness	
Client version of indicator: We respect human rights		
Definition: All members of the household know and respect human rights. They act to be respected as well.		
		
<p>In our household we know our rights and we feel we are respected.</p>	<p>In our household most of us know our rights, but feel like we may be put down or treated badly.</p>	<p>In our household we aren't sure about our rights. We feel put down and/or treated badly.</p>

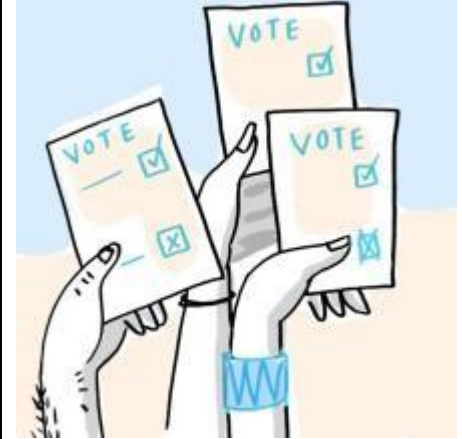


42. Participation in Group Activities

Dimension: Organisation & Participation	Indicator: Participating in Group Activities	
Client version of indicator: We are actively involved in [groups] group-participation		
Definition: Group-participation outside the home. Household members form a group of people who share a problem or common need where they can express support and feel supported, e.g., neighbourhood groups, church fellowship, committees, parent groups, social groups, clubs, etc.		
		
<p>Everyone in our household joins in groups where they can give and feel support.</p>	<p>Only sometimes those in our household attend groups, but they aren't well connected in these.</p>	<p>Some in our household don't belong to any group, e.g. in the neighbourhood, church, committees, parenting or social.</p>




43. Public-Sector Influence

Dimension: Organisation & Participation	Indicator: Public-Sector Influence	
Client version of indicator: We know how to petition		
Definition: The household has the capacity to get organised and ask authorities for a solution to the problems that affect their local community. They know and use the proper channels.		
		
<p>In our household we know who to talk to, to sort problems in our community, e.g. local MP/councillors, or starting a petition.</p>	<p>In our household we don't try to sort problems in our community. We only do so if someone else takes the lead.</p>	<p>In our household we don't know how to get in touch with the local authorities, or we don't bother because nothing ever happens if we do.</p>

44. Registered to Vote and Voting




Dimension: Organisation & Participation	Indicator: Registered to Vote and Voting	
Client version of indicator: We vote in elections		
Definition: All members of the household are registered to vote and they do it regularly.		
		
Everyone in our household is registered to vote and always does.	Everyone in our household is registered to vote, but doesn't always.	In our household no one is registered to vote, or we can't be bothered to vote.

45. Problem- and Conflict-Solving




Dimension: Organisation & Participation		Indicator: Problem-and Conflict-Solving
Client version of indicator: We solve our own problems		
Definition: Assertive approach to problem-solving or making changes to improve the quality of life for family, friends and neighbours.		
		
<p>When we see problems around us, we sort them out positively.</p>	<p>When we see problems around us we usually don't do anything, or we try to fix them but aren't really sure how to do it.</p>	<p>In our household we avoid problems and wait for others to sort them.</p>

46. Needs-Awareness/Life-Map

Dimension: Identity & Motivation	Indicator: Needs-Awareness/ Life-Map	
Client version of indicator: We know how to plan for the future		
Definition: The household is aware their needs go beyond the basic needs of food, housing, etc., and plans for this.		
		
<p>In our household we often think of ways to change our circumstances. We have real targets for the future, and know how to achieve them.</p>	<p>In our household we think about what we want in the future, but aren't sure how to get there.</p>	<p>In our household we don't see the point in trying to change anything</p>




47. Self-Confidence and Self-Esteem

Dimension: Identity & Motivation		Indicator: Self-Confidence and Self-Esteem
Client version of indicator: We believe in self-worth		
Definition: The household has self-worth. Its confidence is reflected externally, internally, and in relationships with their social groups, societal rules, or in their personal goals and standards.		
		
<p>Most, or all of the household, are really confident and secure in many different situations.</p>	<p>Some, but not all of the household, are confident and secure; we aren't that happy leaving our comfort zone.</p>	<p>Most of our household is insecure; we don't leave our comfort zone.</p>




48. Moral Conscience

Dimension: Identity & Motivation	Indicator: Moral Conscience	
Client version of indicator: We consider others when making decisions		
Definition: The ability to make appropriate decisions, respect people, the family and the community.		
		
<p>Our household makes decisions that respect the family and the community.</p>	<p>Our household makes decisions that are in line with the local community but are not necessarily our own.</p>	<p>The household only does what suits it and doesn't care how that affects others.</p>




49. Emotional Intelligence

Dimension: Identity & Motivation		Indicator: Emotional Intelligence
Client version of indicator: We control our emotions		
Definition: Awareness of their emotions and those of others; ability to relate to others, experiencing a wide range of emotions. Awareness to manage relationships with thoughts, words and actions. Awareness of strengths and weaknesses; motivation to achieve goals.		
		
Those in our household read their and other peoples' emotions well. They react well in many different situations and understand how their actions affect themselves and others.	Our household can sometimes read their emotions or those of others well, and know how to react. If there is stress or a problem, though, they might act without thinking or withdraw.	People in our household do things without thinking of the consequences to themselves or to others.




50. Self-Expression

Dimension: Identity & Motivation		Indicator: Self-Expression
Client version of indicator: We have good self-perception
